

I have been a swimmer since I was 8 years old, but I didn't think about it too much until I was 10. It was when I realised I was good at it.

At 10, I started joining GCC competitions. Plunging into the pool, I would race against fellow Qataris, Bahrainis, Saudis, Omanis, and Kuwaitis. That early, I was getting gold medals with boys older than I. It was truly exciting to

end up reaping 2 trophies for best swimmer in my age group.

For two years now, I have been travelling to several countries to compete in international swimming events. To see a lot of swimming world champions in countries like Germany, Singapore, Turkmenistan, Azerbaijan is a dream come true. It feels really good that I swim competitively. My achievements have brought deep pride to my parents, and that really makes me feel good.

I have surpassed my expectations: I hold the Qatari record in swimming, and I hold 1 GCC record of 1.09 minutes in the 100-metre butterfly race I entered into.

That same year, for the distinction of winning 5 gold medals, I received swimmer trophy in Qatar.

I am so happy for what I have accomplished so far. I will continue to scale new heights and break records. I am grateful to my coaches for their kind of training, and every happy event is my way of showing gratitude and giving honour to my parents.

DONATE A BOOK. Students were encouraged to donate a book. The school library held a Book Fair that week simultaneously, where they bought books.







Later during the day the children sat on the grass in the garden area and had a picnic with their friends and teachers. A poster making competition was also held in which Nursery D and Reception E won.







Most of the boys wore superhero costumes and looked so lovely and manly.




A competition for the Best in Costume thrilled teachers and students alike. One boy from their own class was chosen to be pitted against the rest.

In the final stage, students shared and discussed their works in class.


I saw that the boys did really well during the computing practical exam, and I am truly proud of their accomplishment.

Knowledge Centre takes on new name, expands services

Knowledge Centre has been re-named and the department will now be referred to as Learning Support. This change brings with it broader functions that also caters to G&T (Gifted and Talented) pupils as well as EAL (English as an Additional Language) learners.

Learning Support will focus on developing effective and functional programs, designed to meet the specific needs of pupils.

Inclusion into this program is based on in-depth assessments in order that specific learning needs are addressed in a friendly and secure environment.

Once the needs are identified, students are placed in one of the 3 groupings. Instruction will be carried out, based on prepared IEP (Individual Educational Program). The IEP facilitates access to and progress in the curriculum. It is shared with parents so that they have a better understanding of how best to support their child.
