They will be there to inspire our younger students to emulate this success. Many are now in leading roles and professions in Qatar and around the world, making outstanding contributions to public life. We must maintain our links and encourage them to share the effect that Ta'allum has on their professional and personal lives. This will instil a sense of a greater sense of pride in our organisation.

University and External Exam Success

Each year the majority of Ta'allum students begin an exciting and aspirational new chapter in their lives at prestigious universities in Qatar and across the globe. Each year our students celebrate increasing success in IGCSE and 'A' Level exam. We noted last year the record numbers of Ta'allum students who have been inspired to embark on a career in Medicine. Encouragingly, more and more female students are breaking barriers by enrolling on Computer, Science and Engineering courses.

Ta'allum students have achieved the very highest levels. Highly successful Ta'allum Alumni include Hava Al Kuwari (AMAG) who left school having won the coveted Emir's Excellence Prize. She is reading Medicine at Weill Cornell University, where this summer she was awarded the Dean's Honour. AJA's Majed El Khalifa was awarded a NASA scholarship as part of his university sponsorship in Toronto. He achieved straight A grades in all his 4 AS and 3 full A Level subjects. His goal is to be an astronaut. Mohammed Yousef S Y Al-Hor (AMAB) won an award for 'Scientific Research' in the Symposium for Research and Innovation. He is reading Medicine at Qatar University, having been the Highest Achieving Student (IGCSE) across Qatar in Arabic, Biology, and ICT.

A high number of Ta'allum students each year are awarded 'Highest Marks' in the Middle East or Qatar for IGCSE and AS exams, though the pandemic has meant that such awards have not been possible in the last 2 years.

Wider Success - Literacy is the Key

Ta'allum students are experiencing burgeoning success in competitions with a national and international profile: as 'Young Writers', in the Reading Olympiad, in the Excellence Awards, and in Akhlaguna . Sara Al-Maadeed, a Secondary school Ta'allum student at Al Maha Academy for Girls, represented Qatar at the World Schools Debate Championship (WSDC).

And so, to the future. One key reason for Ta'allum's success is clear accountability and clarity about what we are expecting to achieve. In our efforts to build and sustain a successful future for our students, we know if we get the learning right all else follows.

Students across the age range and different phases must be encouraged to succeed in every lesson. At the heart of our next steps for progress will be inspiring our students to develop their skills in Language, Communication and Literacy. It is through reading that we learn, transform, and become better versions of ourselves. With every book we read, we learn how to make the most of our lives. It is also through reading that we nurture the most valuable gift that Allah has given us: our cognitive minds.

Ta'allum Academies – Fast Forward to the Future

The Holy Month of Ramadan provides an opportunity for us all to count our blessings and offer gratitude. On behalf of Ta'allum's Governing Board, my sincere best wishes to you and your families at this special time. I am thankful for the strength of character amongst Ta'allum staff that has helped us to overcome so many challenges in the recent past.

Collaboration

One of the most powerful ways we can support each other is by increasing our collaborative practice as Ta'allum moves forward to meet the **changing demands of 21st Century education**. We have achieved so much together in the last two years with many of our teams working remotely as we have navigated the uncertainty of the pandemic. This has taught us a great deal about efficient, remote collaboration but has certainly reminded us of the irreplaceable value of face-to-face collaboration. Working together is at the heart of Ta'allum's purpose, and now, more than ever, is the time to share and help each other.

Only our best efforts will do in this emerging educational era when we must **'raise the bar'** to be 'competitive.' This is true in the face of many new schools opening in Qatar, and to meet the new raised demands of Thanaweyah. We were delighted by the very positive recent WASC Mid Cycle Review reports which again commended all Ta'allum Academies for their culture of continuous improvement. Despite this, it is not a time for us to be complacent. With our 'new build' Ta'allum schools under construction, our horizons and aspirations must keep expanding, as must the pace of improvement.

The Needs of Ta'allum Students in a Fast -Changing World Ta'allum Governing Board's thinking and strategic planning is driven by the needs of our students, now and in the future. It is self- evident that our world is changing fast. The pace of change, particularly when it comes to new technologies, means the 'half-life' of skills is shrinking fast. The days of a 21 year old moving onto a 'job for life' are gone forever. Ta'allum Academies must adapt in line with this shift and reflect that the essential, in-demand skills of the future will be very different from what has been taught in the past. In other words, what we teach has to change. to reflect the rapid digitisation that is taking place across the world, and not just in education. The raft of current Ta'allum teaching and learning developments, are taking us forward into this new dawn. The implementation of Microsoft Teams, Accelerated Reader, and Century Tech are just three examples of programmes which are **transforming** the education which Ta'allum offers.

It is also clear that the way students learn is changing. Learning from everywhere is becoming the norm, replacing 'lectures' with active learning. Teachers of the future will become facilitators rather than content deliverers. Some of the key developments in Ta'allum will see more digitised content and online learning – a trend that has been accelerated significantly by the COVID-19 pandemic. This emphasis on technology skills is evident as we extend the use tablets for our Year 3 students.

We will also require a focus on **more personalized**, **self-paced**, **and self-directed learning** – in which learning becomes much more flexible, paced to suit the needs of each Ta'allum student, emphasising independent thinking and leadership skills. Innovation and creativity skills (including problem-solving and analytical thinking) will be important for Ta'allum students. Certainly, more collaborative, project-based and problem-based learning better reflects the 21st century workplace. Global citizenship skills including awareness of the wider world, and sustainability are further priorities for us.

I envisage more **immersive learning** – harnessing technologies like Virtual Reality and Augmented Reality to bring topics to life and immerse students in a subject.

Amidst the technological developments, Interpersonal and communication skills, including emotional intelligence, empathy, cooperation, and social awareness, will become key. As machines are able to automate more and more workplace tasks, our inherently human social and emotional skills will become 'hard currency' in the workplaces of the future.

Data Analysis and Creative Leadership

Data is increasingly the vehicle for engaging pupils and teachers as part of the learning process. It forms an essential resource to enable Ta'allum schools to personalise learning more effectively. The work of Ta'allum's Senior Data Analyst, MD Nasirul and his team in developing Power BI Analytics is vital. It gives us the evidence to measure our progress. We will increasingly move from 'post -mortem' type reviews after the event to using the data to predict student performance. Our increasing use of GL Assessments will represent the baselines for accurately measuring our students' progress.

Leaders and staff who add value across all areas of the Ta'allum Group, who take initiative as team players not as individuals, will enable us to reach our goals. I have a sense of optimism for the future of our Ta'allum students. I feel certain that everyone is ready and committed to move Ta'allum successfully into the future.



AMAG YEAR 6 STUDENTS


Innovation isn't just about using technology in isolated lessons. It's about developing new methods of teaching and learning that are carefully integrated into all lessons. The integration of STEAM disciplines (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Maths) has ensured that students are engaged in deep learning while connecting their learning in the classroom to the world around them. In class hands-on learning STEAM activities have encouraged meaningful collaboration, developed critical thinking and problem solving skills and encouraged students to value the arts. The introduction of robotics in Year 5 & Year 6 has provided opportunities for students to explore different scientific theories and deepen their understanding of concepts taught in the Science curriculum. Our girls were excited to participate in the international Hour of Code, which strengthened their coding skills and enabled them to explore new ways of thinking and expressing themselves through technology.

On 7th December 2021, we participated in the Hour of Code. we used computational thinking skills to solve problems and code. We had so much fun and can't wait to code again!











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



Practising Persuasion

One of the highlights in Year 6 this semester, has been the students' efforts in writing persuasive letters! We have focused on features like rhetorical questions, emotive language, and repetition – I strongly believe that you must, must, must read them! The students have written about a range of topics, such as having P.E. every day, students having mobile phones in school, as well as students not having to wear a school uniform. We made cross-curricular links with Qatar History, and students wrote letters to persuade people to visit Qatar. The students discussed the cultural elements of Qatar's community, and its impact on National Identity – it was lovely to hear the students recall the things they had learned, as well as sharing their own experiences. The students then wrote their letters describing Qatari culture, using the persuasive features they had learned in Literacy. The letter discussed the Islamic religion, the Arabic language, values, customs and traditions, and heritage and arts.







Sound!



In Science children in year 4 have been learning about sound. Children made their own string telephones and tested out pitch of sound due to fast and slow vibrations of the string.

They also created and acted out a visual sequence to demonstrate how sound travels to our ears. This



supported them hugely in understanding the stages in which a sound travels.

Children used their self-made instruments and pan pipes to explore the conditions that affect the pitch of a sound.

COMPUTING WEEK AT AMAG

Over the years, technology has revolutionized our world and daily lives. Additionally, technology has created amazing tools and resources, putting useful information at our fingertips.

Modern technology has paved the way for multifunctional devices like the smartwatch and the smartphone. Computers are increasingly faster, more portable, and higher-powered than ever before. With all of these revolutions, technology has also made our lives easier, faster, better, and more fun. During Computing Week, students at AMAG realised that innovation is at the heart of technological change- it distinguishes leaders from followers. With this in mind, many cross curricular activities were planned, in which students used 21st century learning skills like problem solving, critical thinking, collaboration and creativity to connect technology and creativity. The result was amazing!

Rocks!



This semester we have been learning all about rocks and soils. The children have been studying all the different types of rocks found in the world. They went on a rock hunt to see what rocks they could find around school. Then they learnt about which rocks were the hardest. Children were able to group rocks



according to their characteristics Children have been looking at the properties of igneous, sedimentary and metamorphic rocks. They enjoyed creating their own clues to play 'Which rock am I?' They looked at fossils and even made their own fossils with clay.



Our science lessons are full of interactive projects and experiments. Our students do not simply learn about volcanoes and light houses, they build them and test them. The vocabulary that students use during their discussions becomes embedded in



The tradition of equestrian excellence has been a part of Qatari customs for many decades and is an integral passion of many Qataris.



There were celebrations as AMAB students received their grades in March for IGCSE and IAS exams sat in the January 2022 series. Students sat exams across a wide range of subject areas including Physics, Biology, Chemistry, Arabic and Maths, with some excellent results in every area.

There was outstanding achievement in IGCSE. AMAB's Head of Maths, Hiresh Shah said 'Particular congratulations to Ahmad Adel Al-Hamadi and Khalid Nasser Allatifi for being the first ever grade 9 achievers in the Maths IGCSE exam at AMAB, maa shaa Allah!' There were top-grade 9's in Chemistry for Ahmad Adel A H Al-Hamadi, M Fahad Yaser, A Alsaadi and Abdulrahman Jassim M H Al-Hammadi. In Chemistry - Faisal Ibrahim A A. Al-Emadi, Abdulla Rajab A R Al-Esmai and Abdulrahman Mohammad Anwari gained the highest grade 9.

In other outstanding achievements there was great IAS success for Yousef Abdulla S A Al-Sulaiti in IAS Physics, achieving Grade A with a perfect maximum 300 marks out of 300. In IAS Arabic 67% or 24 students gained a top-grade A. Salman Mohd A M Janahi and Sadeq Ahmed Mohammed Maknoon both scored top marks with 100 out of 100.



Since June 2021, Noof and Munera have been taking part in the QNRF project titled "Early Detection of Diabetes". The aim of this project, is to design an app to help detect diabetes via an early diagnosis through analysis of an individual's retina, which is located at the back of the eye. This part of the eye is one of the first parts of the body to be affected by diabetes and therefore damage detected at the retina can lead to early diagnosis. Noof and Munera have been reading research articles on diabetes and it's affects and have completed different types of training on machine learning and artificial technology including a course called Elementaofai and the students also learnt how to do coding using Python.

They have carried out research on previous similar projects that have been carried out as well as looking into the different types of software that have already been developed to help them with designing their app. The girls have also designed a logo for their app which is called "DiaOptic".

Noof and Munera have just submitted a progress report on their project and have completed a literature review. They will now begin to focus more on developing the different types of software to be included in the app with the help of their research Mentor and students from Hamad Bin Khalifa University.


International Literacy Day

Launch of AMAG News


